

Proverbs 22:1-2, 8-9, 22-23

A good name is to be chosen rather than great riches, and favour is better than silver or gold. The rich and the poor have this in common: the Lord is the maker of them all. Whoever sows injustice will reap calamity, and the rod of anger will fail. Those who are generous are blessed, for they share their bread with the poor. Do not rob the poor because they are poor, or crush the afflicted at the gate; for the Lord pleads their cause and despoils of life those who despoil them.

The Epistle James 2:1-17

My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. So speak and so act as those who are to be judged by the law of liberty. For judgment will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment. What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

Mark 7:24-37

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. *Glory to you, Lord Christ.*

Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to

take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter." So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone. Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."

The Nicene Creed



The Great Thanksgiving


The Lord be with you Lift up your hearts. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. And also with you.



NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC from our Director of Music

Here at Trinity, we are blessed to have so many people who have a wide array of musical gifts, in numerous musical genres, that they share so generously with our parish family during our worship services. Today, Bob Maddox will be singing and playing his guitar as he offers several musical gifts during our service:

The prelude, "In The Garden," is a gospel song written in 1912 by C. Austin Miles, a former pharmacist who served as editor and manager at Hall-Mack publishers for 37 years. The song was popularized during the Billy Sunday evangelistic campaigns of the early twentieth century. According to Miles' great-granddaughter, the song was written "in a cold, dreary and leaky basement in Pitman, New Jersey that didn't even have a window in it let alone a view of a garden." Over the decades, it has been recorded by a long list of singers, including Roy Rogers and Dale Evans, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Perry Como, Rosemary Clooney, Elvis Presley, Doris Day, Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson, The Statler Brothers, Glen Campbell, Brad Paisley and many others.

The first musical offering, a "Little Less Like Me," was written in 2020 by Zach Williams, an American Christian rock artist from Jonesboro, Arkansas. He was the lead singer of the Christian rock group Brothers of Grace. In 2016 he went solo. As a solo artist, Williams has released three full-length albums of his music. His second album, *Rescue Story*, includes the single, "There Was Jesus", with Dolly Parton.

The second musical offering, during communion, is "I'll Fly Away," a hymn written in 1929 by Albert E. Brumley, one of the most prolific gospel songwriters of the 20th century with over 600 published songs. Brumley said he came up with the idea for the song while picking cotton on his father's farm in Rock Island, Oklahoma. It was published in 1932 in a collection titled *Wonderful Message*. "I'll Fly Away" has been called the most recorded gospel song of all time and is a standard at many bluegrass jam sessions and New Orleans jazz funerals. One of the earliest recordings of "I'll Fly Away" was made by the Selah Jubilee Singers in February 1941 for Decca Records. Since then, the song has been covered by a wide array of artists, from George Jones and The Stanley Brothers to Bob Marley, Alison Krauss and the Christian rock band Jars of Clay.
