

The Epistle

Hebrews 5:1-10


Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honor, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was. So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, "You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place, "You are a priest forever,

according to the order of Melchizedek." In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

The Nicene Creed



The Great Thanksgiving


The Lord be with you Lift up your hearts. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. And also with you. We lift them to the Lord. It is right to give him thanks and praise.





NOTES on TODAY'S HYMNS from our Director of Music:

Today's **PROCESSIONAL HYMN**, "All Are Welcome" was written by composer Marty Haugen (b. 1950) in 1994. In a world that is often filled with brokenness and alienation, it is a hymn that calls us to wholeness and reconciliation. It calls us, as followers of Jesus, to seek justice and healing among all people. It calls us to affirm that each person is God's unique creation and that, by God's grace, each person is a child of God.

Haugen is a prolific liturgical composer with many songs included in hymnals across the liturgical spectrum of North American hymnals and beyond, with many songs translated into different languages. He was raised in the American Lutheran Church, received a BA in psychology from Luther College, yet found his first position as a church musician in a Roman Catholic parish at a time when the Roman Catholic Church was undergoing profound liturgical and musical changes after Vatican II. Finding a vocation in that parish to provide accessible songs for worship, he continued to compose and to study, receiving an MA in pastoral studies at the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul Minnesota. A number of liturgical settings were prepared for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and more than 400 of his compositions are available for worship in many religious denominations. He is now a member of the United Church of Christ and continues to compose and travel to speak and teach at worship events around the world.

Today's **GRADUAL HYMN**, often known as "The Servant Song," prepares us for the reading of today's Gospel lesson, in which Jesus tells James and John, the sons of Zebedee, that "whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant" for "the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve." "The Servant Song" became a popular text and melody in the early years of the mutual ministry movement and emphasizes Jesus' teaching that servanthood is the priority of those would seek greatness. This wonderful contemporary hymn is found in both **Voices Found** (2004) and **My Heart Sings Out** (2006), both of which are hymnal supplements to **The Hymnal 1982**, which is still the main Episcopalian Hymnbook, which was put together during a ten-year period, beginning in the early 1970s.

Today's **OFFERTORY HYMN**, which is from **The Hymnal 1982**, is "Many And Great, O God Are Thy Works." This hymn tune is based on a Native American melody known as *Dakota Indian Chant [Lacquiparle]*.

Today's **COMMUNON HYMN** is "I've Got Peace Like A River," which is an African-American spiritual which is found in **Lift Every Voice And Sing**, the Episcopalian African-American Hymnal Supplement which was published in 1993 as a supplement to **The Hymnal 1982**

Today's **RECESSIONAL HYMN**, "O Master, Let Me Walk With Thee," is also from **The Hymnal 1982**. The tune, *Maryton*, was composed by Henry Percy Smith (1825-1898). The text was written by Washington Gladden (1836-1918).
