

The Lesson

Job 42:1-6, 10-17

Job answered the Lord: "I know that you can do all things, and that no purpose of yours can be thwarted. 'Who is this that hides counsel without knowledge?' Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know. 'Hear, and I will speak; I will question you, and you declare to me.' I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes." And the Lord restored the fortunes of Job when he had prayed for his friends; and the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before. Then there came to him all his brothers and sisters and all who had known him before, and they ate bread with him in his house; they showed him sympathy and comforted him for all the evil that the Lord blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning; and he had fourteen thousand sheep, six thousand camels, a thousand yoke of oxen, and a thousand donkeys. He also had seven sons and three daughters. He named the first Jemimah, the second Keziah, and the third Keren-happuch. In all the land there were no women so beautiful as Job's daughters; and their father gave them an inheritance along with

their brothers. After this Job lived for one hundred and forty years, and saw his children, and his children's children, four generations. And Job died, old and full of days.

The Epistle

Hebrews 7:23-28

The former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but Jesus holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues forever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him,

since he always lives to make intercession for them. For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect forever.

The Nicene Creed




The Great Thanksgiving



NOTES on TODAY'S MUSIC from our Director of Music:

Today's choral anthem was composed by 45 year-old British composer Philip W.J. Stopford. His work, entitled "Like The Colors Of The Rainbow," was published in 2022. Stopford was trained in the high Anglican style at the most prestigious Anglican musical sites, including, among many others, Westminster Abbey, Truro Cathedral, Canterbury Cathedral and Chester Cathedral. He also spent five years here in the United States, serving at Christ Church in Bronxville, NY, from 2016 to 2021, before returning to the UK in late 2021. I believe the text of this new work perfectly encapsulates what my hope has been for our wonderful music program here at Trinity. It is an anthem that lifts up and celebrates diversity in many aspects of congregational life, including the musical life of a congregation. I also believe it honors our proud Episcopalian and Anglican musical heritage in its style, but also helps us look to the future since it has been composed by one of that tradition's most exciting LIVING composers.
